In this open seminar Dr. Judith Suissa presents her paper "The Political Imaginary of the New Language of Character Education".

ABSTRACT: In this talk, I will explore the way the notions of improvisation and resilience are playing an increasingly central role within the contemporary educational discourse around "character education" in England. I suggest that these notions are taking on a particular meaning within this discourse, reflecting a broader social and political imaginary, and I look at some ways in which educational thought and practice could perhaps draw on a very different imaginary.

Dr. Judith Suissa is Reader in Philosophy of Education at the UCL Institute of Education, London. Her research interests are in political and moral philosophy, with a particular focus on questions to do with the control of education, social justice, libertarian and anarchist theory, the role of the state, political education, and the parent-child relationship. Her publications include Anarchism and Education; a Philosophical Perspective (Routledge, 2006) and (with Stefan Ramaekers) The Claims of Parenting; Reasons, Responsibility and Society (Springer, 2012).
